Polar Bear Hair

Did you know that their fur isn't actually white? Polar bear hair is a hollow tube that provides excellent insulation.

Each hair is a transparent and hollow tube that scatters and reflects light.

Polar bears can build up oils in their fur from eating seals which can make their fur look yellow.


But what colour is the polar bear's skin? Do some research and find out.



Create your own polar bear hair



- Get a see-through sheet of laminate or acetate.
- Roll the laminated sheet into a tube approximately 1-1.5cm diameter. Secure the loose edges with a strip of Sellotape.
- When you move the tube, you can see how the light reflects of the tube and looks white just like polar bear hair.



Facts about polar bears

- 1. The polar bear is the most carnivorous member of the bear family: most of its diet consists of ringed and bearded seals.
- 2. Individual polar bears can travel thousands of miles per year following the seasonal advance and retreat of sea ice.
- 3. At birth, polar bear cubs are 30-35cm long and weigh around 450g
- 4. The polar bear is an excellent swimmer and individuals have been seen in open Arctic waters as far as 200 miles (320 km) from land.
- 5. Polar bears have an excellent sense of smell and can smell seals almost 1 mile away.



Polar Bear Myths and Legends

Once there was a poor hunter. He always went out but never got anything. Finally one day he saw a polar bear. As he crawled toward it over the ice, the bear said to him, "Don't shoot me. If you follow me and do what I say, I will make it so you will always be able to get whatever animals you think about."


